INTRODUCTION



FREDERICKSBURG, VIRGINIA

STATE HOUSE, ANNAPOLIS ANNE ARUNDEL COUNTY

Built 1772 from the designs of Joseph Clarke. The wooden dome which dominates the radiating streets of the old town was added after the Revolution in 1784. A fine interior staircase was sacrificed at the time the modern extension was added at the rear.

BRICE HOUSE, ANNAPOLIS

Built 1740 by Thomas Jennings. One of the most dignified houses of Maryland. Roof pitch, 44°. A splendid example of brickwork, main façade composed entirely of headers. Flat window trim. Beautiful carved cornice. Main staircase simple with delicately carved mahogany riser and hand rail. Rooms finished in moulded plaster with carved wood mantels. Now owned by the Carvel Hall Hotel Co. In a fair state of preservation. Plates 1 to 9 and 31.

PACA HOUSE, ANNAPOLIS


Built 1763 by Governor William Paca. A weak imitation of the Brice House, lacking the beauty of mass and proportion of the original. There are several beautiful mantels in the interior. Now Carvel Hall Hotel.


CARVEL HOUSE, ANNAPOLIS

Built about 1750 by Upton Scott. The main façades of header bricks. Hipped roof of a lower type than most Annapolis houses. Very classic treatment of the interior doorways. Now occupied by the sisterhood of Notre Dame. Much of the charm of the exterior has been destroyed by a coat of paint over the brickwork. Plates 19 and 14.

RIDOUT HOUSE, ANNAPOLIS

Situated on Duke of Gloucester Street. Built about 1763 by John Ridout. The garden elevation contains an interesting triple window which breaks through the main cornice of the house. Main façades of header bricks with the usual projecting course of four bricks at the level of the first story. Plate 19.






CHASE HOUSE, ANNAPOLIS

Built 1770 by Edward Lloyd. His architect was named Randall. A three story box-like exterior in Flemish bond. Contains a monumental stair hall lighted by a Palladian window on the first landing. The carved interior detail is lavish and beautifully executed. There is a very lovely marble mantel in the parlor, see page 29. Now the Chase Home for Aged. Plates 13 to 18.

HARWOOD HOUSE, ANNAPOLIS

Built 1774 by a Mr. Buckland for William Hammond. A fine example of Colonial city architecture. Bricks laid in Flemish bond. Front and rear doors are of good proportion with beautiful carved detail. Interior inaccessible. Plates 10 to 12.



LIVING SERVICE 10 20 ACTON

ACTON ANNE ARUNDEL COUNTY

Built about 1790. The home of the Murray family. Noteworthy for its unusual exterior and attractive entrance porch. The two end bays of the façade are crowned by pediments while the central one is subordinated. The two great chimneys are set their long face parallel to the main façades. The interior rooms are small and the detail uninteresting. The house is in bad repair. Plates 14 and 15.


WHITEHALL ANNE ARUNDEL COUNTY

Built about 1750 by Governor Horatio Sharp. A refined and delicate exterior of formal plan. Square two story central saloon. The interior doors, windows, and mantels are finished in very beautiful carved wood trim. The stairs are subordinated, being placed in the wings. An open lawn 50' x 400', flanked by gardens, stretches down toward the water. The house has been tastefully restored and is kept in first-class repair. Plates 22 to 27.



TULIP HILL WEST RIVER, ANNE ARUNDEL COUNTY

Built about 1750 by Samuel Galloway. On the land front is a one story porch with ornamented pediment. The rear elevation commands a series of formal garden terraces. Over the rear door is a beautifully carved and unusual canopy. Brack-



ets are used in the main cornice on the front of the house but there are none at the rear. The staircase is carved mahogany of very fine proportions. The building is beginning to fall into decay. Plates 27 to 31.

RATCLIFFE MANOR TALBOT COUNTY


Built by Henry Hollyday. Situated on level ground. The avenue of approach is three-quarters of a mile long. The brickwork is exceedingly fine. The interior wood paneling is well preserved and of good design. The box garden retains its original pattern although now grown to huge proportions. There is still in evidence on the estate the hole from which the clay for the bricks was taken. Plate 32.


WYE HOUSE TALBOT COUNTY

The original house, built by Edward Lloyd in the seventeenth century, was destroyed by fire. The present wooden structure was erected about 1770. The interior woodwork and hardware bears a resemblance to that of the Chase house in Annapolis. The great pediment of the main house is effective at the end of the long vista, but the lesser pediments of the wings detract from the composition. The grave yard and the brick orangery survive, and the gardens still retain their original beauty.

HOMEWOOD, BALTIMORE


Built in 1809 by Charles Carroll for his son. A small house of very lovely proportions and fine though late detail. It is a representative Maryland house having the two wings attached to the main building by low corridors. Now occupied as the administrative building of the Johns Hopkins University. See No. 16 of Bibliography. Plates 33 and 34.






MOUNT VERNON POTOMAC RIVER, FAIRFAX COUNTY

Built in 1743 and enlarged by Washington himself in 1783 by the addition of two wings with hipped roof, and a two story portico carried across the entire river façade. The north Palladian window was the General's especial pride. The house and out buildings are built of wood. See Appendix A for Washington's letter referring to the enlargements. Plate 97.



GUNSTON HALL POTOMAC RIVER, FAIRFAX COUNTY

Built in 1758 by George Mason. The house is small and low and in a setting planned for intimacy and privacy. A long narrow walk bordered by box leads through the gardens and ends at a steep terrace overlooking the Potomac. There are two porticos quite different in spirit, the one on the river side being a Colonial interpretation of the Gothic. The interior is richly paneled in wood and elaborately though somewhat over carved. The house is kept in good condition today. Plates 38 to 40.



WOODLAWN, POTOMAC RIVER FAIRFAX COUNTY

Built in 1799 by Lawrence Lewis who married Nellie Custis, Washington's stepdaughter. Dr. William Thornton was the architect. The house has been very much added to and altered. A very simple beautifully proportioned elliptical staircase is the most noteworthy feature. Plates 37 and 38.

POHICK PARISH CHURCH FAIRFAX COUNTY

Built in 1769. A square box-like brick church said to have been designed by George Washington. The original interior was lost through being used as a stable during the Civil War. The two doors are of very fine proportion and English Georgian in character. Plates 43 and 44.

CHRIST CHURCH, ALEXANDRIA


Built in 1773. The main body of the church is similar to Pohick, though the presence of the tower gives it a very different appearance. There is an interesting Palladian window behind the altar. The two doorways exemplify a very attractive use of quoins. See Appendix B for copy of original specifications. Plates 41 to 43.


LLOYD HOUSE, ALEXANDRIA

Built in 1796. A fine old house located on Washington Street. The brickwork has not the varied texture of Christ Church or of many of the Maryland houses. There is a simple entrance doorway which may safely be called the best, in a city of fine doorways. Plate 45.

FREDERICKSBURG SPOTTSYLVANIA COUNTY


The town of Fredericksburg, although the center of a group of famous houses of which Chatham, built 1780, and Brompton are typical, derives its chief charm from the small old houses along the main street. There are many fine doorways, sloping slate roofs with quaint dormers, and massively proportioned chimneys. Plates 46 and 48.





KENMORE, FREDERICKSBURG

Built in 1753 by Colonel Fielding Lewis, who married Betty, eldest sister of George Washington. A house massive in proportion with walls marred by paint. Its chief interest is in the ornamental plaster work of the ceilings and mantels, executed by Hessian prisoners captured at the battle of Trenton. There is a fine mahogany staircase now painted white. The risers are ornamented with an unusual delicately carved ivy leaf. Plates 49 to 52 and page 10.





MUNDY HOUSE, DUMFRIES PRINCE WILLIAM COUNTY

Built in 1756. A small brick house, all headers in the front façade, but with poor exterior detail. It contained until recently a very fine room, done in an unusual manner with a low wainscote and denticulated cornice. Plates 47 and 48.

STRATFORD POTOMAC RIVER, WESTMORELAND COUNTY

Erected 1731 by Colonel Thomas Lee. A monumental house built on the H plan and dominated by two groups of arched chimneys. The living rooms and the main hall, or saloon as it was called, with high coved ceiling have been placed in the second story and are reached directly by long flights of steps. The house was the birthplace of General Robert E. Lee. Plate 53.






CLEVE RAPPAHANNOCK RIVER, KING GEORGE COUNTY

Built in 1754 by Charles Carter. Quoins are used in the treatment of the windows, doors, and corners of the building. The interior was gutted by fire in 1800 and restored in crude carpenter's imitation of Colonial mouldings. Plate 54.

GAY MONT RAPPAHANNOCK RIVER, CAROLINE COUNTY

Built about 1725 by a Mr. Catlett. Stucco wings have been added to the original frame building creating an unusual plan. The house is chiefly noteworty for the old-fashioned picture wall paper which still remains finely preserved in the entrance hall and dining room. Plate 54.



TAPPAHANNOCK ESSEX COUNTY


The small town of Tappahannock on the Rappahannock River has many charming old houses. The old Brockenborough house has a very lovely vestibule on the river side. Plate 55.


BLANDFIELD RAPPAHANNOCK RIVER, ESSEX COUNTY


Built about 1730 by Colonel William Beverley. A large roomy house connected by passages with its wings. On the interior little detail of interest remains. Plate 56

BROOK'S BANK RAPPAHANNOCK RIVER, ESSEX COUNTY

Built in the latter half of the eighteenth century. A small brick house of fine proportions with dominating chimneys. The delicate interior circular staircase is given an unusual arrangement. Plate 56.









MARMION KING GEORGE COUNTY

Built late in the seventeenth century. There is a freshness and interest in the interior carved paneling. In 1782 a Hessian prisoner undertook to extra-decorate the parlor panels in oils mixed from native materials. The room has been removed to the Metropolitan Museum in New York City. Corner fireplaces are used throughout and half of one side of the parlor is set at an angle. See No. 4 of Bibliography on page 24.

SABINE HALL RAPPAHANNOCK RIVER, RICHMOND COUNTY

Built in 1730 by Landon Carter. The house is paneled in the heavy but effective Virginia type of detail. The stairs with beautifully carved risers are placed off the main hall. A fine columnar porch was added to the eastern elevation at a comparatively early date. The bricks have unfortunately been painted. The garden retains its old box border and much of its original charm. Plates 57 to 59, and 31.







RAPPAHANNOCK RIVER... RICHMOND COUNTY

Built about 1765 for Francis Lightfoot Lee, son-in-law of the founder of Mt. Airy. The house is of the same unusual brown sand-tone now covered with stucco. Its chief interest lies in its well preserved interior woodwork from which some idea can be reconstructed of the original interior of Mt. Airy. Plate 65.

MOUNT AIRY RAPPAHANNOCK RIVER, RICHMOND COUNTY

Built in 1750 by Colonel John Tayloe. The interior as well as the cornice, chimneys, and roof were destroyed by fire in 1844 and hastily restored with consideration only for comfort and economy. The exterior is of native brown sandstone, with trim of fine white sandstone, said to have been brought from England. The formal setting and character of the house and the monumental scale of the gardens suggest a European designer. A charming entrance motive is supplied by the carved stone urns in the forecourt. Plates 60 to 64.




WILLIAMSBURG JAMES CITY COUNTY

The majority of the old houses of Williamsburg still contain fine interior paneling and woodwork. The Wythe house on the Palace Green is a noteworthy example. Tazewall Hall, the home of Sir John Randolph



and later of Edmund Randolph, though very much altered and moved from its original site, still contains some fine examples of interior Colonial work. Other interesting buildings are the Saunders, Blair, Coleman, Tucker, and Cary houses, Basset Hall and the buildings of William and Mary College. The old Powder Horn on Duke of Gloucester Street was built in 1714 by Governor Spottswood as the powder magazine for the colony. Plates 71 and 72.




THE COURT HOUSE, WILLIAMSBURG JAMES CITY COUNTY *

Built in 1700 from designs said to have been made by Sir Christopher Wren. A beautifully proportioned small building which has suffered from fire. In the restoration, stuccoed Doric columns, never placed in the original construction, were added to the portico. It is believed, however, that, if it was the intention of the designer to use columns, they should have been in the Ionic order, in keeping with the very beautiful cornice. Plates 69 and 70.

BRUTON PARISH CHURCH, WILLIAMSBURG


Completed in 1715. One of the most beautiful as well as one of the largest churches of Colonial Virginia. Built in the form of a Roman cross. The mass and detail are well proportioned. Of great simplicity, dependent for its charm on the beauty and refinement of the brickwork, which is laid in Flemish bond with glazed headers. The transepts are interestingly composed with arched doorways and round windows above. The interior has a flat plaster ceiling and is most effectively simple in design. Plates 66-69.



THE COURT HOUSE

YORKTOWN YORK COUNTY

Yorktown contains some of the most picturesque old houses of Virginia many of which were built with the typical exterior chimneys. The town is dominated by the Nelson house built in about 1740. Although the plan is a formal rectangle great variety has been obtained in the size and arrangement of the interior rooms. The reception room is treated with an unusual application of segmental columns, being about one-third of the diameter of the column at the base. Plates 97 and 98.





NELSON HOUSE.

CARTER'S GROVE JAMES RIVER, JAMES CITY COUNTY

Built about 1740 by Carter Burwell. The interior is fully paneled with fine detail, which reflects, especially in the great hall arch, the massive character of the exterior. The staircase, which has carved applied newels on the wall side, is especially beautiful. The house is beginning to fall into bad repair. The detached









wings are well proportioned examples of cottage architecture.

SHIRLEY JAMES RIVER, CHARLES CITY COUNTY

Commenced in 1660 by Colonel Edward Hill I and enlarged and developed about 1700. A square three story house with pretentious dependent buildings. The two-story porches added in 1800 at front and rear are of unusually fine proportions. The great hall contains a famous "hanging" staircase. The soffits of the steps are boldly undercut. The rooms on the ground floor are all paneled in wood with detail of great purity and refinement. Plates 78 to 90.






WESTOVER JAMES RIVER, CHARLES CITY COUNTY

Built about 1730 by William Byrd II. The house has a compelling beauty of mass, obtained by its high pitched roof and tall chimneys, with a very beautiful entrance doorway as the point of interest. The interior detail is elaborate though perhaps not so pure as nearby Shirley. There are beautiful wrought iron entrance gates at the rear and a very lovely fence with ornamented posts. The house has suffered by the rebuilding of the wings and the addition of two story passageways connecting them to the main building. Plates 91 to 93.

LOWER BRANDON JAMES RIVER, PRINCE GEORGE COUNTY

Built about 1730 by Nathaniel Harrison II. The sleeping rooms are in the wings which antedate the main body of the house. In the north wing there is a stair with a so-called Chinese rail, a feature common enough in New England but seldom found in Virginia. There is good carved detail in the main living rooms,

which has the Virginia characteristic of strength. The wainscoting suffered during the Civil War. The existing porches are unfortunate restorations with jig saw detail. Brandon's greatest charm is in the scale and variety of planting in the gardens. Plates 94 to 96.



SMITHFIELD AND ST. LUKE'S CHURCH JAMES RIVER, ISLE OF WIGHT COUNTY

St. Luke's church was built in 1632. Here, as at Jamestown, wall buttresses were used. The windows are round headed with a center brick mullion dividing into two pointed lights.


Smithfield itself is an interesting old commercial town which still retains something of its original character. In the old Morrison house there is a fine spiral staircase confined in a space 7'-3" x 11'-6". It is said to have been built by a travelling Englishman to extricate himself from debt.


BACON'S CASTLE JAMES RIVER, SURRY COUNTY

Built about 1660 by Arthur Allen. The house earned its title when it was seized and fortified in Bacon's Rebellion in 1676. The unusual triple chimneys and the rough hewn timbers testify to its early date. Little detail of interest survives. Plate 96.

MALVERN HILL JAMES RIVER, HENRICO COUNTY

Built late in the seventeenth century by Thomas Cocke. A small unusual house of very homelike plan. Great refinement is evident in the brickwork as well as in the carefully studied details of the corner cellar stairs and the arrangement of the chimney nooks. Destroyed by fire in 1905. Plate 72.





WILTON

JAMES RIVER, HENRICO COUNTY

Built about 1754 by William Randolph III. The chimneys remind one of Westover but the effect is less impressive because of the lower roof. There is a fine entrance doorway. The interior is very beautifully paneled though it has suffered unfortunately at the hands of "restorers." Plates 100 and 101.

RICHMOND JAMES RIVER, HENRICO COUNTY

It was not until 1779 that the city of Richmond displaced Williamsburg as the capital of Virginia. Its situation was too remote for early development. The town grew to importance in the time of the Classic Revival and is filled with old buildings erected under its influence. Principal of course is the State Capitol, where the hand of Thomas Jefferson was felt. The old Wickam house built in 1812 from the designs of Benjamin Mills contains an especially lovely circular staircase. It is now the Valentine Museum. Veneration for the town of Richmond and the affection which is felt for its old columnar buildings has led to a misapplication of the term "Colonial" to its architecture.



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TUCKAHOE JAMES RIVER, GOOCHLAND COUNTY


Built about 1712 by Thomas Randolph. Of unique plan. Contains two very beautiful staircases, the one in the north wing being very elaborately carved. The detail bears a striking resemblance to that of the grand staircase at Rosewell and it is very likely that the same workmen were employed upon it, since the Pages, the proprietors of Rosewell, were related to the Randolphs. Plates 102 to 105.

GOOCHLAND COUNTY COURT HOUSE

A typical Virginia court house with columnar portico. Heavy but not unattractive in mass. Plate 112.

ROSEWELL YORK RIVER, GLOUCESTER COUNTY

Built in 1725 by Mann Page I. One of the most pretentious houses of Virginia. There was a great forecourt with semi-circular wooden columnar porticos connecting the wings. The interior was once elaborately paneled. The great grand staircase as well as the rear stair were both richly carved. The house was burned in 1916. Plate 99.



ABINGTON CHURCH YORK RIVER, GLOUCESTER COUNTY


Part of the building dates from 1660 but the church, as it stands, was constructed in 1765. It is a typical example of the cruciform Virginia church with moulded brick used in the base course and doorway. Plate 100.

MYERS HOUSE, NORFOLK

Built in 1791 by Moses Myers. A typical Norfolk house and a splendid example of the late Colonial city type. The apparent fineness of the ornament and the transition from the carved to the composition detail is to be noted. Plates 106 and 107.


MONTPELIER ORANGE COUNTY

Built in 1760 by James Madison, the father of the president. In 1809 the house was enlarged under the supervision of the architect Dr. William Thornton. The great portico is of virile proportions. The entasis of the columns begins very near the base. The present owners have greatly enlarged the house and have added another story to the wings. The famous garden is said to have been inspired by the amphitheater of the House of Representatives. Plates 108 to 110 and title page.



TALLWOOD ALBERMARLE COUNTY

Built in 1804 by Tucker Coles. The main wing is of brick sheathed with wood. There is an exceptionally beautiful mantel in the living room carved with great freshness of detail. Plate 117.




ESTOUTEVILLE ALBERMARLE COUNTY

Erected in 1830 by John Coles III. Though built in the period of the Classic Revival the house follows Colonial lines. The details, however, are in the inferior manner of the later period. Plate 111.

MONTICELLO ALBERMARLE COUNTY

Thomas Jefferson's home, commenced by him in 1771 and enlarged in 1796 from his own designs. His work may be called the culmination of the Colonial though in reality it is the beginning of the Classic

Revival. Jefferson realizing that American builders were not equipped for their task, directed the way toward scholarly research. Had his followers been one-half as painstaking, the country would have been spared many of the box-like columnar monstrosities, which nowadays are often dubbed "old Colonial." See Nos. 17 and 18 of Bibliography. Plates 114 to 116.




FARMINGTON ALBERMARLE COUNTY

In 1803, Jefferson assisted his friend George Divers with the enlargement of his house near Charlottesville. Hexagonal terminations as at Monticello were incorporated in the plan. During a temporary absence, it is said that something happened which displeased Jefferson so that he abandoned the project. The capitals are to-day of a size far too small for the columns. Plate 117.


BREMO JAMES RIVER, FLUVANNA COUNTY

Built about 1814 by General John H. Cocke from plans by Thomas Jefferson. The design has been well executed and its greater simplicity makes it perhaps even more charming than Jefferson's own Monticello. The columns are of moulded brick. The detail is in fine proportion. Plate 118.



THE UNIVERSITY OF VIRGINIA CHARLOTTESVILLE, ALBERMARLE COUNTY

Commenced in 1817. Designed and executed by Thomas Jefferson. One of the few really monumental conceptions in America. Jefferson has worked out his proportion with mathematical accuracy and painstaking devotion to Palladio. The Rotunda or library dominates the head of the lawn. The students' rooms are located in ranges interspersed with professors' houses. Plates 112 and 113.



BRICE House ELEVATION ML























TRANSEPT DOOR, BRUTON PARISH CHURCH WILLIAMSBURG, VIRGINIA










Plate 75 STAIR DETAIL, CARTER'S GROVE JAMES CITY COUNTY, VIRGINIA








